1994 1 2 This constitutes the third order of simulacra in contrast to the second order which was still dominated by production and a market law of value Baudrillard 1993 50 Baudrillard uses the term value in both its economic and linguistic sense Drawing on Marx and Saussure he differentiates between two dimensions of value First there is a structural aspect corresponding to Marx's idea of exchange value Each sign within a signifying system or each commodity within a system of exchange can be related to each other sign or commodity the structural di
