Synclavier

Dear Sirs,
I am writing to commend your recent discourse of the N.E.D. Synclavier II. Surely this machine is the state-of-the-art computer musical instrument? Even the admirable Fairlight pales into insignificance by comparison.

I found the several pieces and discussion of the musical capabilities of the machine very interesting. Despite these excellent reports I find that you have appeared those who are primarily musicians amongst your readership at the expense of the technically oriented part. Documentation concerning the Synclavier II is hard to come by and I expect it is expensive, which you actually find it (more than \$9p for E&MM).

Although I now know in some detail the musical abilities of the Synclavier, you have neglected to tell us how it does what it does. For instance, what exactly is the Able processor (LSI II board, Micro T33/11) or custom processor? Are the digital synthesizers wholly hardware or microprocessor controlled? Do they use special signal processors? How do the voices work? How is all the necessary multiplication and division worked out in sufficiently small time to keep the Synclavier viable as a real-time instrument?

I would like to see more in-depth questions like these answered. A recent criticism of your magazine has been that it tries to satisfy the technical-minded at the expense of the musicians. This balance should be equal, but please do not give tantalising snippets of information which give rise to a hoard of unanswered questions. So please let's have a Synclavier II part 3 - an in-depth technical review. Could you do a similar study of the Crumar GDS?

Finally, congratulations on an excellent publication pursuing greater excellence.

There doesn't appear to be any system in use at the moment which reproduces acoustically played music. The Synclavier, for instance, can print music and sample acoustic sounds, but can't turn samples into a score, the Roland MC8 can be programmed by a Corbett (or CTI) have allowed using a patch for voltage conversion, but the MC8 cannot print music. The problem lies not in ascertaining the pitch of a note, but in

applying the software necessary to calculate note lengths, spacing, slurs etc. in the printed score.

One possible series beginning this month. This allows subscribers to be sampled, and their frequency acknowledged. Future episodes should make it possible to write software for the Synclavier Spectrum or other mixer which will calculate note spacing and other features and allow a printout of any music played into the system.

Rhythms

Dear Sirs,
I read with interest your review of the Godwin Drummer 32P, and look forward to the day when I can get some money together and go out and buy one of these machines. But I know there are a lot of musicians who like me have to perform on a very small budget. There is a cheaper alternative. At present I am using a Yamaha PS-20 and Casio MT-45; it is possible to connect a pedalboard to these, as I have done. The Yamaha has an individual volume control for drums and arpeggio, although bass and chords are on one volume control. The Yamaha PS-20 sits at about £300 and the Casio MT-45 at £200; the pedalboard I constructed for £25.

I use two amps on this set-up; a bass amp slaved off the main amp which gives as near as possible a stereo effect (e.g. bass on the right of the stage, guitar amp in the middle and rhythm with drums on the left of the stage). If there are any readers who would be interested in this method, they can write to me and I will gladly send them any information I can on the matter. I would like to fit individual output sockets for each section of the keyboard, i.e. bass, rhythm, drums and arpeggio outputs. Can anybody help me with this project?

Wasp

Your help would be very much appreciated. Also, is there a manual of any sort to go with it, or a good general book on using 'Synthesizers'?

The Wasp was manufactured by Electronic Dream Plant, who are no longer in business. However, a lot of their products are still in circulation, and the prices are reasonable. They are cheap, and are generally very reliable. These comprise the Wasp itself, the Wasp Deluxe, a larger version with a 3-octave mechanical keyboard and wooden end panels, the Gnat, a smaller version of the Wasp with a 24-step oscillator, the Speeder, a 252-step pulse line or 54-step real time digital sequencer compatible with any of the synthesizers and featuring a versatile clock input for synchronization to a rhythm machine (tape clock), the Special Model Gnat, featuring a more complex front than the standard model, and the Caterpillar, a 3-octave keyboard capable of controlling up to 4 Wasps or Gnats for polyphonic sound. Because EDP equipment works to a non-standard digital system it's easiest only to use it with other EDP products. Manuals for EDP equipment are difficult to obtain nowadays; a more general book on synthesizer use would be Dave Crombie's 'The Complete Synthesizer', published by Omnibus Press, and reviewed in E&MM October '82.
